



MUSEUM VILLAGE

The Scugog Shores Museum Village shows what daily life was like in Scugog from the mid 1800s to the mid 1900s. We preserve, research, interpret, and exhibit artifacts related to the cultural and natural history of the Township of Scugog area.

The Village is home to 11 heritage buildings, gardens, and the Ojibway Heritage Interpretive Lands.

Buildings include a log cabin, a Victorian-style farmhouse, and various trade shops including Blacksmith shop, Woodwright shop, Harness shop, and Print shop.

The Ojibway Heritage Interpretive Lands exhibit is a partnership between the Scugog Shores Museum Village and the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation. Together we created an exhibit area to interpret the natural and cultural history of the Scugog Watershed before Europeans settled in the area and includes a recreated birchbark wigwam.

The Museum Village is also available to rent for private events such as lecture series, receptions, PD Days, and more!



GRADES K-4 AVAILABLE APRIL - NOVEMBER

Discover how early settlers created a place for themselves in Canada by clearing land, constructing homes, and building villages. Investigate the origins and contributions of these early immigrants and discover the skills they were taught by their First Nations neighbours.

Topics - Settler tasks and community building, Indigenous peoples and settler relationships, technology, and food production.

Visit includes tour and activity (full day option: take home craft)

GRADES 5-8 AVAILABLE APRIL - NOVEMBER

As a result of our exhibition partnership with the Mississaugas of Scugog Island, students will have the unique opportunity to explore traditional First Nations culture by walking the trails of our Ojibway Heritage Interpretive Lands, listening to stories in our re-created wigwam and exploring our collection of First Nation artifacts. The role of the environment in shaping culture will be investigated as well as the contributions of the First Nations to the development of Canada and the consequences of their relationship with the settlers.

Visit includes village tour, games, and blanket exercise (full day option: more in-depth look at indigenous culture and settler relations)

Topics - Indigenous peoples, relationship with settlers, traditions and culture, natural environment.

HISTORY AT PLAY

GRADES K-4 AVAILABLE APRIL - NOVEMBER

Discover the past through play. How did settlers and Indigenous people live and share resources? What did they do for fun before the rise of electronics, radio, and television? Be immersed in history at play!

Visit includes village tour, hands-on Heritage Fair activity (full day option: take home craft)

Topics - Settler life, Indigenous peoples, heritage pastimes, technology and food production.

GRADES 1-4 AVAILABLE MAY - OCTOBER

Explore how agriculture shaped every day life. How did Indigenous peoples and European settlers prepare food for winter? How did they care for spring and summer crop fields? Students will learn about life in 1800s Canada, agricultural practices, food preparation, and growth of consumerism.

Visit includes village tour, activities (full day option: take home craft)

Topics - Indigenous harvest, early settler harvest, tools, automation (industrial revolution), and consumerism (packaged goods).

JK- GRADE 3 AVAILABLE NOVEMBER - DECEMBER

Come and see the Museum Village decorated for the holidays and tour the Victorian farmhouse and the Log Cabin to trace the evolution of Christmas traditions from the 1800s to the present. Investigate the origins of holiday items like the Christmas tree, Santa Clause, Christmas cards and plum pudding. Compare and contrast Christmas traditions in the past, the present, and around the world. Visit includes tour and craft.

Topics - Holiday traditions, community development

ACCESSIBILITY

Due to the nature of the heritage buildings, the museum village is not currently wheelchair accessible.

DRESS

Students are encouraged to dress for the weather as programs operate rain or shine and include outdoor activities. It is often cooler and windier at the Village and students are encouraged to bring an extra layer to stay warm.

PARKING

If your group will be bussing to the site, the bus may drop off in the main parking lot. Teachers and parents may be required to park in the overflow parking to allow room for bus drop-off and pick-up.

ARRIVAL

Intend to arrive at least 15 minutes early to get students settled and organized for the best program experience.

LUNCH

Outdoor picnic benches and a large field are available for lunch breaks during full day programming. Students must be supervised by a teacher at all times. Indoor accommodations are available in inclement weather.

PARENT HELPERS

Due to building capacity limits, it is suggested to keep adult helpers ratios 1:5.
